Thriving Communities Grants

Philanthropy Northwest invites eligible organizations to apply for its Thriving Communities grants! Over three years, we will award \$40 million in grants to tribal nations and communities who have been negatively impacted by environmental changes in Alaska, Idaho, Oregon and Washington.

Call for Applications

We are currently accepting applications for all three grant types.

Examples of what can be funded include projects that improve air or water quality, increase access to quality nutrition, provide green job training, offer youth environmental justice programming, support healthy homes and more. 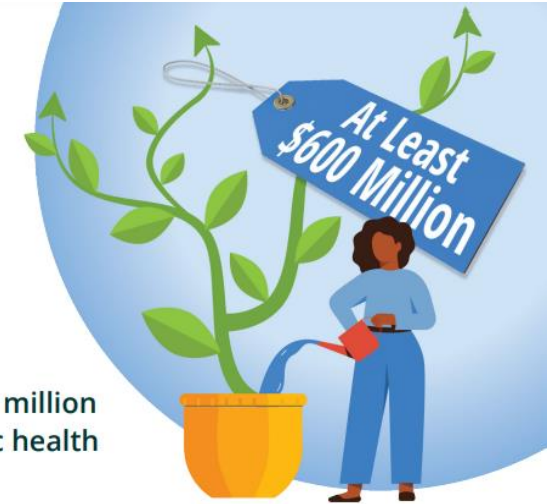
Environmental Justice Thriving Communities Grantmaking (TCGM) Program

- Funds from the Inflation Reduction Act
- **\$600** million distributed from EPA to 11 intermediary orgs to provide subgrants for environmental justice, focus on historically underinvested communities
- PNW is the **Region 10 Grantmaker selectee** (AK, ID, OR, WA, and tribal nations in these states)
- \$48 million awarded over 3 years
- Priorities: Chronically underinvested communities & environmental justice



Environmental Justice Thriving Communities Grantmaking (TCGM) Program

EPA's TCGM program provides at least \$600 million to address environmental justice and public health issues in underserved communities.



TCGM cooperative agreements are collaborations between EPA and 11 grantmakers around the nation to reduce the burden of the federal grants application process and distribute federal funds to potential applicants working to address environmental justice issues.

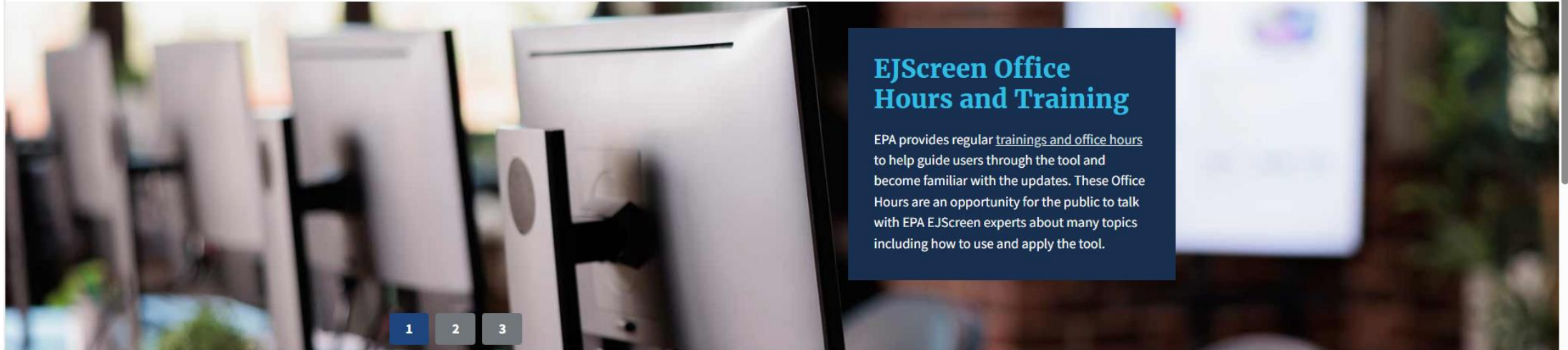


EPA EJScreen 5 Min Overview



EJScreen is EPA's environmental justice mapping and screening tool that provides EPA with a nationally consistent dataset and approach for combining environmental and socioeconomic indicators.

Once here, locate your proposed project address to determine whether or not the target population is an EPA IRA Disadvantaged Community.

Special Consideration for Target Population Identification

Underserved and disadvantaged communities are defined by Executive Order 13985. Please consider the following definition while answering the questions in this section.

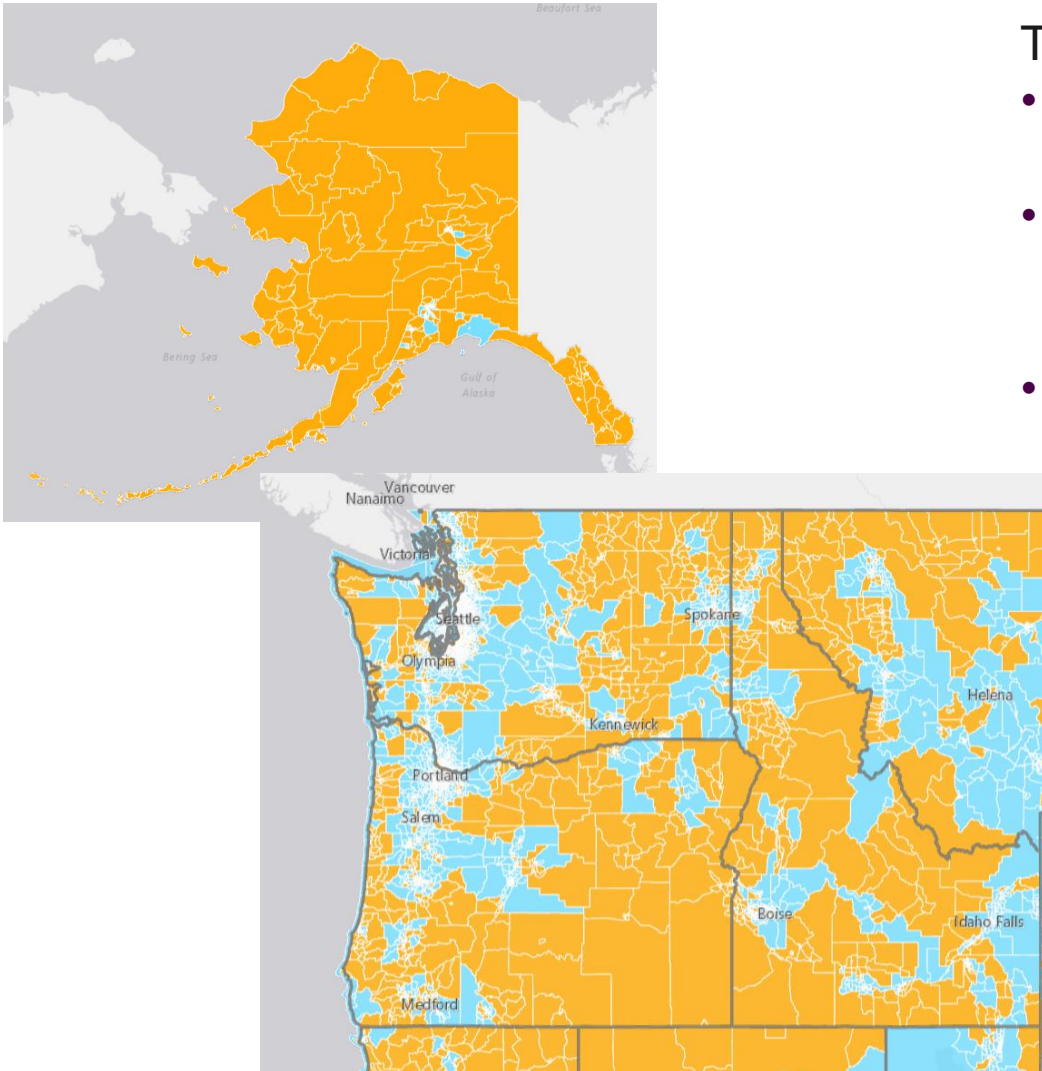
"populations sharing a particular characteristic, as well as geographic communities, that have been systematically denied a full opportunity to participate in aspects of economic, social, and civic life...". This includes communities such as Black, Latino, Indigenous, and Native American persons, Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders and other persons of color; children, the elderly, members of religious minorities; lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, and queer (LGBTQ+) persons; persons with disabilities; persons who live in rural areas; and persons otherwise adversely affected by persistent poverty or inequality. For purposes of this RFA, "underserved communities" also include "environmentally overburdened communities" (that is, communities adversely and disproportionately affected by environmental, climate, and human health harms and risks including remote, rural, and urban communities), and disadvantaged communities.

- Any census block group at or above the 90th percentile for any of EJScreen's Supplemental Indexes when compared to the nation or state,
- and/or any of the following geographic areas within the Tribal lands category in EJScreen:
 - Alaska Native Allotments
 - Alaska Native Villages
 - American Indian Reservations
 - American Indian Off-reservation Trust Lands
 - Oklahoma Tribal Statistical Areas

For the next question,

1. Please go to this link to determine the frontier and remote (FAR) score for your proposed project: [Am I Rural? Tool - Rural Health Information Hub](#)
2. On this site, enter the zip code or county for the primary location of your proposed project (upper left corner of the screen).
3. Once you enter your zip code or county, click "**Run Report**"
4. Scroll down to the section titled: "Frontier and Remote Area (FAR)", to get your FAR score (Level 1-4).
5. Enter your FAR score on the application.

You will not be evaluated on your FAR score. We are asking to understand the full context of your project.


FAR Level/Score*

- FAR Level 1: Remote from urban areas of 50,000 or more people
- FAR Level 2: Remote from urban areas of 25,000 or more people
- FAR Level 3: Remote from urban areas of 10,000 or more people
- FAR Level 4: Remote from urban areas of 2,500 or more people
- Not located in a Frontier and/or Remote area
